From Castles to Clean Energy

Special effects: light footsteps on stone

Kid 1: Hello explorers!

Today we are going on a special journey, a journey through time.

Close your eyes for a moment and imagine stepping back hundreds and hundreds of years... into the Middle Ages.

Special effects: gentle wind

Kid 2: You can think of this scenario for example.

Kid 3: There are no cars on the roads, no aeroplanes in the sky.

Kid 4: No tall glass skyscrapers, no electricity at night.

When the sun goes down, everything becomes dark... except for candles and firelight.

Special effects: crackling fire

Kid 5: But don't forget that even without modern technology, people built houses, entire cities, churches and large castles.

Building in Medieval Times

Kid 1: People didn't have factories or trucks to transport materials from far away.

They used what nature offered nearby, sometimes with enormous physical effort.

Kid 2: If there were forests, they used wood. If there were mountains, they used stone. If the soil was clay, they made bricks.

Castle walls were made of heavy stone blocks.

Roofs were covered with wooden beams.

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Small houses often had walls made from clay mixed with straw.



Roofs in villages were sometimes made of dried grass — this was called thatch.



Kid 3: Builders worked with simple tools: hammers, chisels, ropes, and wooden cranes.

It was hard work.

Kid 4: Sometimes it took 10, 20, or even 50 years to finish a big castle!

Kid 5: Can you imagine building something your whole life? It was really hard work that employed a lot of workers.

Travelling in the Middle Ages

Kid 1: Now, imagine you had to visit another city, or go visit a relative or friend. Back then, there were no cars, no gas stations, no highways, no trains, no airplanes.

Kid 2: If you had to visit another place, you had only a few choices:

Kid 3: Ride a horse

Special effects: horse trotting

Kid 4: or sit in a cart pulled by oxen

Special effects: cart wheels rolling slowly

Kid 5: or sail on a wooden boat using the wind.

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Special effects: water and wooden boat creaking

Kid 6: Or simply walk for days.

Special effects: Steps on stone

Kid 7: Travel was slow and sometimes dangerous.

People depended completely on nature, on animals, rivers, and wind.

Special effects: strong wind

Kid 8: Nature was not only their home. It was their power.

Building Today

Kid 1: Now let's come back to today.

Today, we have machines, trucks, computers, and electricity.

We can build houses much faster.

But we have learned something very important.

Special effects: Nature ambience

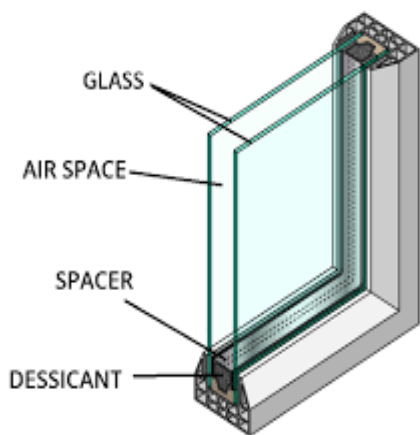
Kid 2: Our planet needs protection.

That's why many architects and builders think about eco-building.

Kid 3: Eco-buildings are designed to use natural or recycled materials, save and collect rain water for domestic use or water the plants. Save electricity and reduce pollution (Carbon footprint) using public transport, walking, biking and so on

Kid 4: Modern homes may have special windows, insulated walls, and roofs that keep heat inside in winter and outside in summer.

Renewable Energy

Kid 1: Hey, did you know that a long time ago, in the Middle Ages, people used wind and water... without even knowing the word “renewable”?

Kid 2: Really? So they didn’t know about solar panels or wind turbines?

Kid 3: Nope! They just used what nature gave them. Like wind to turn mills or rivers to move waterwheels.

Kid 4: Ohhh... so today we do the same, but smarter, right?

Kid 5: Exactly! Renewable energy is energy that never runs out, like the sun, which illuminates us every day. Solar panels transform sunlight into electricity. The wind blows across fields and seas. Wind turbines transform wind into energy.

Kid 6: Water flows in rivers and hydroelectric plants use moving water to create energy.

All together: Instead of burning fuels that pollute the air, we can harness nature's clean energy.
